

HISTORY CORNER - 200 YEARS AGO!

MEMORANDUM FROM GOVERNOR LACHLAN MACQUARIE 29<sup>™</sup> JANUARY 1818, INSTRUCTING FRANCIS GREENWAY:

To make a Ground floor Plan and Elevation of a Factory & Barrack sufficient to lodge 300 Female Convicts, on an Area of Ground of 4 Acres, enclosed by a Stone Wall 9 feet high.(1)

## MORE PROFILES - "OUR GIRLS" BY BETH MATTHEWS AND ANNE MATHEWS

**CATHERINE BIRD** was 16 years old\* when she was convicted in Dublin on 17<sup>th</sup> August 1825. Her offence was "stealing from her mistress" and she was sentenced to seven years transportation. (1)

Catherine's family circumstances were dire as indicated in the following petition from her widowed mother Mary, pleading mitigation of Catherine's sentence:

## Mary Bird of 33 Montgomery St. Dublin

Most humbly showeth.....is a desolate, disconsolate and widowed mother of Catherine Bird now a prisoner on the gaol of Newgate, for a crime committed by her, against her mistress Mrs Southwell of Mecklenberg St., wherein your Excellency's, child is aged 16 is under sentence by the law of 7 years transportation from this land.


That the late husband served in His Majesty's army 88<sup>th</sup> Foot, 13 years and lost his life at the storming and taking of Badajoz\*\* and left her with four younger children unprovided for with the exception of what sum the officers contribute to me. That petitioner returned with her young infants to Belleim, Portugal and was forwarded to England then proceeded to Ireland.

That petitioner has since her arrival lived in the neighbourhood of Ninety Ninth Street, endeavouring by the remainder of the contribution afforded by the said officers, honestly and industriously rear and educate her children and has not the means to support her but the produce of son's industry, a youth of 18 years and his income is 7/7 a week. That under all those disturbing circumstances your humble petitioner most fervently prays Your Excellency's direction for mitigation of her daughter's sentence wherein she will be restored to an aged widowed mother and desolate soldier's wife, whom she will in affirmative. Be ever in duty bound to pray. Mary X Bird (her mark). (2)

Mary's petition was not successful and Catherine Bird embarked *Lady Rowena*, departing Cork on 19<sup>th</sup> January 1826. The ship carried 100 female convicts and arrived in NSW on 17<sup>th</sup> May 1826 after a direct voyage of 118 days. On the ship's muster roll Catherine is described as: *single*; *catholic*; *none* (education); *no previous conviction*; 5 ft. 0¼"; *ruddy complexion*; *slightly pock pitted*; *brown hair*; *hazel eyes*. After arrival Catherine was assigned to *J. Mcarthur, Sydney*. (3)

In 1826 Catherine applied for permission to marry Brian McMahon per *Atlas* and again in 1828 to Henry Welsh (aka Henry Vose) per *John Barry*. Permission was granted but neither event was registered.

In 1826 Catherine was reassigned to John Cobb, York Street, Sydney and two years later in the 1828 Census, she is listed as *a government servant* and in the Factory at Parramatta. (4)



No reason was given for her being in the Factory, but family research tells us of the birth of her first child, Mary Ann (c1828) which may have been the reason. No registration of the birth has been found.

Catherine was granted a Ticket of Leave dated 8<sup>th</sup> November 1830 with the remark - for good conduct in the Factory. In 1832 Catherine was granted a Certificate of Freedom with the general remark; Wife of Wm. Garner, free per Hebe. (6)

- \* Catherine may have been older than 16 and her age adjusted later on the ship's Muster she is noted as 19; on the 1828 Census she is noted as aged 20. \*\* In 1812, a joint Anglo-Portuguese army led by Arthur Wellesley (later Duke of Wellington), besieged Badajoz, Spain and forced the French garrison to surrender.

Catherine Bird and William Garner were married on 8<sup>th</sup> June 1831 with the marriage registered in St Mary's Sydney. William was a brick maker and held a Ticket of Leave. (7)

William had been convicted in Lancaster, England on 20<sup>th</sup> March 1820; his offence was "highway robbery". He was sentenced to death but the sentence was then commuted to transportation for life (8). In 1837 he was granted a Conditional Pardon seventeen years after his arrival in NSW. (9)

Catherine and William had eight children: Mary Ann (possibly born in the Factory Parramatta c1828); George, 1834, Sydney; John, 1835, Parramatta; Susan, 1838, Concord; William, Brickfield Lane; Rosanna, 1844, East Maitland; Rebecca, 1847, West Maitland; Catherine (Kate), 1849, East Maitland.


The place of baptism for the children shows the family moved around, because of William's work most likely.

On 6<sup>th</sup> September 1882, Catherine Garner died from pneumonia in East Street, Maitland and was buried at St Joseph's Roman Catholic Cemetery. The death certificate shows her father was a "blacksmith" and that she had been a widow for 20 years. (10)

(6) Certificate of Freedom - Catherine Bird

One of the oldest female convicts to be transported was on board the ship *Lady Rowena*. *Catherine Finn* was 80 years old and had been convicted of *passing bad money* and sentenced to seven years. Her son had been transported the previous year. Catherine died in November 1826 whilst in the Female Factory. Sadly, she was never to be reunited with her son which was most likely the reason for her crime. (11)

In the late afternoon I spied the local State member and the Premier, alerted Beth who in apron and cap was off like a shot; then watched as she charmingly negotiated the security cordon and spoke to the Premier who now has souvenirs of the day including a promotional badge (*Herstory Matters*) and a memory of a most polite encounter with one of the "girls"!
